Too many children in the world have their first contact with a book in a completely unknown language. To change this, the Bücherpiraten (Book Pirates) from Lübeck, Germany, invented the 1001 languages project. The aim of the project is a database full of stories written by children, for children all over the world.

Three Groups of children already created three picturebooks. They worked on the story and drew the pictures by themselves. After the workshops the picturebooks were translated into many different languages. Families and promoters of reading from all over the world can download stories for free in any two languages at www.bilingual-picturebooks.org.



It was a lot of work to create the bilingual picture-books. The children made up the story, worked on it and drew the pictures. The adults were merely there for advice and support.







On the last day of the workshop, the children presented the complete picture-book to their families and friends.













After the workshops, the books were translated by professional translators into six base languages: Arabic, English, French, Mandarin, Russian and Spanish. Using the seven language versions, a large group of volunteer native speakers translate the stories into as many languages as possible.





The website of the project www.bilingual-picturebooks.org was launched in April 2016. Families and promoters of reading all over the world can choose their own combination of languages and download the stories for free.






The feedback to the project shows, that the demand for bilingual picture-books is huge. User all over the world explain how they use the books in their everyday life:

"We are using the books in the residential home for refugees and in the library to provide families with bilingual books."







"The parents can read the story to their children in their mother tongue. When the children are going to school later, they could read the story by themselves in German some day. That would be great."



"I take care of a young family from Eritrea/Sudan and gave them one of the bilingual picture-books. The young woman went to school for only four years. They were very happy about the book. I told them that they can read the story to their young child, too."


